## Conversions in Acts "Conversions in Corinth" (Acts 18:1-11)

## Introduction:

- 1. Before Jesus ascended to heaven, He gave the Great Commission to the apostles (Matthew 28:19-20; Mark 16:15-16; Luke 24:45-47).
- 2. The specific plan for carrying out this mission is revealed in Acts 1:8.
- 3. As Luke showed how this mission was fulfilled in Acts, he also wrote about a number of conversions that occurred.
- 4. Studying these conversions will help us understand how we become Christians today.
- 5. Previously, we have examined the conversions of:
  - a. about 3,000 people in Jerusalem on Pentecost (Acts 2)
  - b. people in Samaria (Acts 8:5-25)
  - c. the eunuch of Ethiopia (Acts 8:26-39)
  - d. Saul (Acts 9:1-18; 22:1-16; 26:1-18)
  - e. Cornelius and his household (Acts 10; 11:1-18; 15:7-11)
  - f. Lydia and the jailer, as well as their households, in Philippi (Acts 16:13-34).
- 6. Paul eventually traveled to Corinth where he preached for an extended time.

## Discussion:

- I. (Acts 18:1-11) LUKE WROTE ABOUT THE CONVERSIONS OF MANY PEOPLE IN CORINTH
  - A. (vs.1) Paul traveled to Corinth from Athens.
  - B. (vs.2-3) In Corinth, Paul lived and worked with Aquila and Priscilla.
    - 1. Aguila and Priscilla had recently moved to Corinth.
    - 2. Because they also worked as tentmakers, Paul lived and worked with them.
  - C. (vs.4) Paul worked as a tentmaker; however, he taught in the synagogue every Sabbath.
  - D. (vs.5) Silas and Timothy joined Paul in Corinth.
    - 1. Silas and Timothy had been in Macedonia.
    - 2. Paul indicated in 2 Corinthians 11:9 that they brought a gift to him.
    - 3. Consequently, Paul earnestly declared to the Jews that Jesus is Christ.
  - E. (vs.6) After the Jews rejected his message, Paul turned to the Gentiles.
  - F. (vs.7) Paul went to the home of Justus.
  - G. (vs.8) Crispus, his household, and many people in Corinth were converted.
  - H. (vs.9-11) The Lord encouraged Paul, and he taught in Corinth for a year and six months.
  - I. Later, Paul wrote two letters to the Christians in Corinth that have been preserved for us.
- II. INFORMATION FROM 1 & 2 CORINTHIANS RELATING TO CONVERSION
  - A. (2 Corinthians 5:17) A Christian is a new creature.
  - B. (1 Corinthians 6:9-11) This occurs when a person is "washed," "sanctified," and "justified in the name of the Lord."
  - C. (1 Corinthians 12:13) It is through baptism that a person enters the Lord's one body (Romans 6:3-4; Galatians 3:27).
  - D. In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul especially emphasized the fact that Christians are members of the one body (vs.12, 14, 20, 27).
    - 1. It was necessary for him to do this because the Christians in Corinth possessed a diversity of spiritual gifts (1 Corinthians 12:1-11).
    - 2. These gifts were given when the apostles laid their hands on Christians (Acts 8:14-17).
    - 3. Even though spiritual gifts played a vital role in the growth and edification of the early church, they would eventually cease to exist (1 Corinthians 13:8-10).
